My journey to Grahamstown began exactly 6 months before it actually took off. On 2 January 2017, I was sitting in my kitchen having my first cup of tea for the day when my telephone rang. A voice I did not recognize said "is that John Ramsdale," I said that it was indeed. The person said "I want to ask you a question to which I hope the answer will be yes, that is all I need at this moment." I asked what is the question? She said would you come and do your Bonhoeffer presentation at the Grahamstown National Festival of the Arts in July. I was total bowled over by this but I said "yes."

The idea for a Bonhoeffer presentation dates back to 2015 when the Dean of St George's Cathedral asked if I

would consider doing something in the cathedral during Holy week. I said I would think about it and when the Lent programme was circulated I saw that I was down to do something on Monday night in Holy week under the heading 'The way of the cross'. I had to think fast and come up with something. It was then that the idea came to me of telling the story of the life and death of Dietrich Bonhoeffer, a young pastor and theologian of the German Church who took on the might of Hitler's evil Nazi empire and paid for it with his life. I consulted various sources and was able to come up with version of his life ending with his death by execution aged 39 in 1945. And which I could tell in approximately 1 hour. It was this compilation which they wanted me to bring to Grahamstown.

My companion / sponsor and I set out for Grahamstown on Sunday 02 July 2017. We flew from Cape Town to Port Elizabeth and drove to Grahamstown arriving there in the late afternoon. On Monday 3rd July, I did my first performance in St Patrick's church in the centre of Grahamstown. It was presented under the umbrella of the Spiritfest. It was well received with a better than expected audience I was told. On the next two days we were able to attend some of the festival events on offer and to visit various places of interest, including the Anglican Cathedral, the impressive monument Theatre complex and the beautifully situated monastery of the Order of the Holy Cross just outside Grahamstown. We were also able to just walk about and soak up some the sight and sounds of Grahamstown. On Thursday 6 July I did my second performance which was equally well received and on Friday 07 July we left Grahamstown in bright sunshine with a 28 degree temperature. We flew from Port Elizabeth and arrived back in Cape Town at 14h00.

So ended six quite extraordinary days in which I was privileged to be a part of one of the artistic highlights of the year 2017. - **John Ramsdale**



During June I was once again privileged to be part of The Eighth Consultation of Anglican Bishops in Dialogue that took place in Nairobi, Kenya bringing together bishops and archbishops from Ghana, Kenya, South Africa, Tanzania, Zambia, Canada, England and the United States of America. In the spirit of 'continuing indaba' following Lambeth Conference 2008, this gathering continued the pattern of respectful listening, discussion, and fellowship, structured around the Eucharist and Morning and Evening Prayer, according to the Kenyan liturgy.

Here are edited extracts from the latest Testimony released following our gathering entitled **"A Testimony of Mutual Commitment and Pulling Together – "Haraambe"** (The full Testimony is available on our diocesan website: www.ctdiocese.org.za).

"There was a man sent from God whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify concerning that light, so that through him all might believe. He himself was not the light; he came only as a witness to the light." John 1: 6-8. (Cf also Chpts 4:28-30,39-42; 17:20-21 and 1 John 1:1-3).

We learned about Haraambe, a principle unique to the founding of independent Kenya yet existing in every traditional community by various names. Haraambe means to pull up together, join hands, to build up, especially in times of community need when resources are scarce. It arose in the context of political and social fragmentation. Haraambe is a collective effort in which all voluntarily participate in a commitment for the common good, creating a new identity, a new vision for community, greater opportunities when everyone's contribution is welcomed. We are grateful to Canon Francis Omondi acted as a listener and provided guidance into the history, power and possibilities of haraambe as a theological framework for including all and forming community in processes of change.

The new Kenyan Primate, Archbishop Jackson Ole Sapit, personally came to warmly welcome us and later returned to speak of the Anglican Church of Kenya, with more than six million members in thirty-eight dioceses, plus the Military Episcopate. We learned about their clear and focused strategic plan for the next decade to close the gap between Christian faith and Christian practice, to engage social media as a means of evangelism and disciple building, and to integrate social transformation with personal faith development. By so doing they hope to regain a role for the church as a key opinion-shaper in the public square and a convenor of public discussion of the values that support the fullness of human life to which our faith testifies: physical, spiritual, intellectual, moral.

The 22 bishops present considered the cumulative experience of this consultation since it first met in London in 2010. Growing organically from 12 in the first gathering, some 49 bishops have now been involved in the process. We remain entirely committed to this vital work with one another, as we are convinced of the unique productivity and value of our gathering. We considered how our configuration could best facilitate our conversations as we look to Lambeth Conference 2020 and beyond. We recognized much that we have valued in these dialogues, which has changed our ministries and our lives - e.g. Myths and stereotypes, misunderstandings and propaganda have been broken down. It is also clear we have so much more in common than the issues that divide us and threaten our unity at this time.

Similarly there have been surprises - e.g. Listening first hand to someone is very different from reading about each other. And in spite of our differences, often resulting from our global contexts, mutual respect, deep friendship, hard won growth of trust and deep commitment to one another and to this dialogue has developed. We have committed to gather again next year in London, Ontario, Canada to continue this dialogue and journey together



as Anglican leaders. For the second week in Kenya I was joined by Archdeacon Joshua Louw and Fr. Grant Damoes for a review of the series of Peer Mentoring Workshops arranged by Trinity Church Wall Street for the Anglican Church in Africa which we had attended during 2015/2016. (More about this in the next edition).

Diocesan News: Fr. Matt Esau, UCT Chaplain, retired at the end of June after serving in various capacities over many years, while Fr. Richard Cogill our Dean of Studies, has tendered his resignation effective the end of August to return to the USA. Mr David Bailey's contract as Diocesan Property Manager also concluded at the end of July. We extend our sincere appreciation and gratitude to them for their dedicated ministry and contribution to the life of our church and diocese. We wish Fr. Matt and David well in their retirement and to Fr Richard blessings in the ministry he is due to take up in The Episcopal Church of the USA.

St Dominic's Hanover Park





STOP Human Trafficking Awareness Workshop

HOPE Africa recently facilitated a STOP Human Trafficking awareness workshop at St Paul's Anglican Church in Philippi.

The workshop was attended by 55 participants, comprised of both young and old parishioners and community members.

Human trafficking is a global crime affecting countless victims around the world - yet its actual scope remains a mystery. Human traffickers trick, transport, trap and use victims for their own selfish gains.

According to the South Africa National Human Trafficking Resource Line, someone becomes a victim of human trafficking every



30 second. It is further reported that approximately five out of four victims of human trafficking are women and girls. Therefore,

anti-Human Trafficking activities needs to be on the agenda of every parish in the province. The participants of the workshop

were encouraged to be involved in the following:

- Prevention of trafficking in persons
- Protection of victims of human trafficking
- Prosecution of trafficking offenders

The workshop also included a play performed by two male actors portraying the horrors of human trafficking and the drug trade.

uation and reflection) and the Prayer Room (a place where any prayers could be said in secret and in confidence). These rooms brought about some tears, as well as some new-found strength within our youngsters.

We ended off the night with a Eucharistic service celebrated by the Youth Chaplain, the Revd Chesnay Frantz. Often, we as young people get so caught up in our lives and end up getting disconnected from God.

The Praise-a-thon was a great way to help each other to reconnect with God and with one another.
